Here is some information about our research projects.

Research is when someone from a university looks into something and writes a report. Often they work with AAC users and their families when they look into ways people communicate.

We tell health services and other people about our research so that they can improve health and care services.

AAC evidence base research

AAC is used to mean many different ways to help someone communicate. It could be simple things like pointing, signing, writing or drawing. It could also be using a special device like a machine that 'speaks' words for you.

We ran a 3 year project with the University of Sheffield, Barnsley Hospital NHS Foundation Trust and Manchester Metropolitan University.

This project collected together all the correct information about AAC.

This correct information can now be used by people to improve services.

It can also help AAC users to campaign for better services.
